Transforming Community-Based Research And Education: Mutual Learning from Canada, Palestine, and Lebanon

June 16-20, 2016

"Community engagement" has become a priority goal across the social sciences for working with marginalized groups, from training students to engage in community-centred approaches and to develop community mobilization skills in their professional lives, to community-based and participatory research around social problems. These topics are considered particularly important for communities going through major crises, such as war, violence, and persistent lack of resources. But university-led programs face particular, structural barriers to incorporating these principles into their work, and their attempts to do so can produce miscommunication, misrecognition, and perverse outcomes. When universities want to engage in community-led projects or teach community mobilization skills in a context of crisis, what happens on the ground? How can they draw students and community members from these communities into the process of learning and developing these skills and structures? What are the best practices that have emerged for research or teaching that is reflexive, participatory, and critical, but which provides clear benefits to communities?

The workshop is designed both to bring together faculty, staff, and students from universities in the Middle East, Europe, and Canada who work on these issues, and to serve as a working meeting for those involved in Community Mobilization in Crisis, a research & teaching project that is preparing to offer a certificate program in community mobilization in crisis, at first to refugee and other students in Lebanon, and eventually to students in Canada and elsewhere.
